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VII. Essential Question(s):

Why is it important to remember the events that happened in our backyard in 1864 during the Civil War?

VIII. **Brief Description of Content:** The Atlanta Campaign was a series of battles around Northwest Georgia that led to the surrender of Atlanta.

IX. Materials Needed:

Computer

Handouts

Teacher Directions

LCD projector

Notebook paper

X. Instructional Methods:

a. Hook:

- i. Students will view the video of a cannon demonstration at Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park (http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=wy5MmqKVrp4&NR=1)
- ii. Think Pair Share: Think: Students are asked to think silently about hundreds of cannons going off at one time. Pair: Students are then asked to find a partner. With their partner, they should write a list of adjectives that would describe the scene that they just imaged. Share: Students will then share their list with the class.

b. Activities:

- i. Task #1: Civil War Animated Activity (http://www.civilwaranimated.com/AtlantaAnimation.html) Teachers will use necessary technology to show the animated Atlanta Campaign (either whole group, small group sharing computers, or one-to-one computing), primarily focusing on the battles around Kennesaw Mountain by referring to the handout titled "Teacher Directions".
- **ii.** Task #2: Students have a handout titled "Civil War Animated Activity Sheet" for them to use with the website. It consists for a grid map

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assignment as well as a modified timeline assignment and cloze reading assignment.

- iii. Task #3: Using a cell phone, the teacher can call the audio tour (http://www.nps.gov/kemo/planyourvisit/upload/KEMO_Cell_Phone_Tou r.pdf) and have the students virtually tour the park using the Google Earth map (http://www.nps.gov/kemo/planyourvisit/maps.htm) from the National Park website.
- **c. End Task/Assessment:** As a culminating activity, students will review the information from the previous activities and write an essay response to the following question, citing specific examples to support their thesis:

To what extent did the geography of Northwest Georgia play a part in the decisions made by the commanders of both sides during the Atlanta Campaign?
